FIRST REFORMATION PROTESTANT MARTYR, JAN HUS (JOHN HUSS) JULY 6, 1415

Students of the New Testament will remember that the first "Christian" martyr is recorded in Acts 7 with the stoning of Stephen. Who is considered the first Reformation Protestant to die for convictions based on the Holy Bible? Usually when we consider the Reformation, Martin Luther is the first person who comes to mind (Though he was willing to die for his convictions, Luther died a natural death). But you would be hard pressed to pick up a book on the subject that does not first refer to the reformed ministry, death and martyrdom of Bohemian priest Jan Hus, d. July 6, 1415 (burned at the stake under the condemnation of Rome). Both Luther's supporters and enemies cited uncanny parallels between Hus and Luther though they were separated by a full century. What united them on many common, important issues came from God's Word, and we can learn much from both. Sunday, July 7, we'll commemorate Hus' martyrdom by including in the Divine Service his powerful hymn on the Lord's Supper, LSB # 627.


LADIES MOVIE RETREAT FOR JULY:

After the Christian Education Committee reviewed the video material in the library 48 were retained and 181 were discarded. This enabled us to remove some of the old metal shelving that did not have backs on them. We purchased an additional bookcase with money that had been donated (thank you Wayne Cook for putting the bookcase together for us). The books have been reorganized and put in correct order according to the Dewey Decimal Call Numbers on the spine of the books. A small desk has also been purchased to put the card catalog files on which makes it easier to access. After removing the cards for books and videos that were no longer in the library, the files are much easier to locate what you are looking to find. The desk could also be used with your laptop if you are doing some research.

I inventoried the books in 1994 and there were 1102 books. Now after inventorying the books there are 1328. Not many books are being checked out, but they are available for your use.

The round table was removed a few months ago and a rectangle one was moved into the library. This gives more space for people at their meetings. The chairs could use some reupholstering, but that needs more talent than I have!!

The opening Divine Service and all convention sessions will be livestreamed and archived at lcms.org/convention/livestream. For a detailed schedule, see lcms.org/convention. All times are Eastern Daylight Time.

Shortly after a livestream ends, the archived video will be available for viewing. In addition, news stories will be posted to the *Reporter* website (*reporter.lcms.org*) throughout the convention, and nightly video recaps will be available at *lcms.org/convention*.

Subscribers to LCMS News, the Synod's free email news service, will receive daily updates with links to new stories and video recaps. To subscribe, visit lcms.org/reporter-signup.
